

Speak up. Work safe. Video contest 2018

CONTEST RULES

Visit youngemployeesafety.org/contest/ for details about the contest and theme.

By entering this contest, entrants agree to abide by the following rules:

Production rules

- Create a video with the theme “Speak up. Work Safe.” This theme needs to be the focus of your video. **See the “What we want” page at youngemployeesafety.org/contest/ for examples of speaking up and ideas on how you can integrate the “Speak up. Work safe.” theme into your video.**
- At some point in your video, you must include the theme tagline, “Speak up. Work safe.” either in text/graphics or verbally.
- At some point in your video, you must also include the title of your production. Include the names of video participants; the name of your high school and/or club in your video is optional.
- You must maintain personal health and safety for your cast, crew, and others working on the video. Do not endanger anyone in the making of your video.
- Participants must be high school students who live in Oregon.
- All footage, including music, must be your own creation and must not infringe on any third-party rights. You must obtain proper, legal permission to use someone else’s copyrighted material.
- If your video identifies a specific business, you must obtain and submit their written permission with your entry form.
- The video, including any title or credits, must be 90 seconds or less.
- Entrants grant the project the right to use their names, photographs, and video submissions for advertising, publicity, and promotion purposes, and to spread the word on young worker safety.

Submission rules

- Your video must be a high-quality version in an acceptable file format of .mp4, .mpg, or .wmv.
- The file name of your video must include the title of your production, the name of the primary contact person, and your high school’s name. Homeschooled students should state “homeschooled.” This allows us to match the file with your entry form. For example: Safety Stars_Jane Doe_Safety High School
- Entrants now have the option to submit their video either electronically or on a USB thumb drive or disk. See the applicable set of rules pertaining to your method of submission below.
- All videos must be accompanied by an entry form. (HANDWRITTEN FORMS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.)
 - If submitting your video electronically: Fill out the entry form electronically, print the form, sign it, scan all pages, and submit the entry form as a single PDF file electronically along with your video submission.
 - If submitting your video on a USB thumb drive or disk: Fill out the entry form electronically, print the form, sign it, and include the completed entry form with your USB thumb drive or disk.

- All participants, including producers, actors, musicians, and anyone else whose image or sound is on your submission, must be listed on the entry form.
- Everyone under 18 years of age **who appears on screen** must have a parent's or guardian's signature. Participants must be listed on the entry form and have a parent or guardian signature to receive the prize money, should the video be one of the contest winners.
- On the entry form, complete the information about your School/Club and Teacher/Advisor. Completing this information is crucial so that we can give the matching award to your school or club should you win. Even if you are submitting on behalf of a club, you still must provide your high school information. Clubs and organizations are only eligible to receive the award if they are recognized through your school as being an officially sanctioned club or organization. In this instance, an officially sanctioned high school club or organization are those recognized by your school with the ability to receive direct funding. If you mark that you are representing a club or organization, the award funds will be given to these organizations if they are eligible. If they are not eligible to receive these funds, the money will instead be directed to the qualifying high school. We will not be able to provide a matching award if you are not enrolled in school or are homeschooled.
- Entries will not be accepted if they are late, damaged, or cannot be viewed because of technical error.
- O[yes] is not responsible for entries that are delayed, lost, misdirected, incomplete, damaged, or destroyed.
- All entries become the property of O[yes].
- All entries must be submitted by **5:00 pm on Thursday, February 1, 2018.**

Electronic submission

- Email **Tawnya.Swanson@oregon.gov** for a link to be able to submit your video and entry form electronically. The subject of your email must be "Video contest entry." The title of your production, the name of the primary contact person, and your high school's name must all be included in the body of your email. You will then receive an email from Biscom with an invitation to register and set up an account.
- Once registered you can upload your entry form as a single PDF and video file by clicking the "Add File" button. Each file will need to be uploaded separately. You will receive an email notification once your video and entry form have been received.
- In order to submit your video on time, you must email Tawnya Swanson to request access to Biscom **by 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, February 1, 2018.** Once you receive your email invitation from Biscom, you **must upload and submit your entry form and video file within 24 hours of receipt** of that email.

Hardcopy submission (USB thumb drive or disk)

- All entries must be postmarked or hand delivered no later than **5:00 p.m. on Thursday, February 1, 2018.**
- Mail entries to Young Worker Video Contest, Oregon OSHA, Attn: Tawnya Swanson, PO Box 14480, Salem, OR 97309.
- You can also hand deliver entries to Oregon OSHA, Attn: Tawnya Swanson 350 Winter Street NE, 3rd Floor, Salem, Oregon 97301.
- Submit a copy of the original; make sure you keep the original version of your submission.
- No entries will be returned.

Judging criteria

Eligible* videos will be scored by a panel of judges selected by O[yes] members. Scoring will be based on the following criteria:

Content (60%): The safety and health message is original, clearly communicated, uses the “Speak up. Work safe.” theme effectively, and appeals to the two following audiences:

1. Teen workers: The video is creative, relevant and has a cohesive, memorable storyline.
2. Safety educators: The message is accurate and will allow the educator to engage and inspire teen workers to be safer on the job.

Video production (40%): The acting, editing, and audio-visual elements are of high quality.

* “Eligible videos” must follow all production and submission rules.

The decisions by the judges on all matters relating to the contest are final and not open to dispute. If O[yes] does not receive enough entries of sufficient quantity or quality, O[yes] reserves the right not to award any prizes.

Notification of winners

- All winners will be notified no later than April 28, 2018.
- A complete list of winners, along with video clips of winning submissions, will be posted on the O[yes] website at www.youngemployeesafety.org. Information about the contest winners will also be distributed to public media.

Prizes

One first prize: \$500

One second prize: \$400

One third prize: \$300

Winners’ schools or officially sanctioned club or organization will receive a matching award. All finalists will be invited to a special event where we will reveal the top three prize winners.
